#### **Forest School**

Wow what a term we have had in forest school. The children have embraced their experiences with enthusiasm and joy. We have seen the children develop in confidence, resilience and perseverance, which has been very evident especially in the second half of the term. # **Squirrel Class**

It feels like this half-term has flown by! Squirrel class has been working hard during the build-up to Christmas. During their Science lessons, they have studied the properties of materials. They enjoyed it, as I have never seen them so engrossed in their work!

In English, we have been looking at the book 'The Man Who Walked Between Two Towers' by the author Mordicai Gerstein. The class is looking at the tightrope walking feat Phillipe Petit completed in 1974. Using Phillippe's story, we have been exploring how to construct interesting and imaginative character descriptions. Year 3 has worked hard on this and is settling well into KS2.

In Guided Reading Years 4, 5, and 6 have been absorbed in Malorie Blackman's novel Cloud Busting, an intriguing story of friendship they have enjoyed working through. The whole class has also thrown themselves wholeheartedly into this term's art lessons, impressing me with their creativity and confidence.

Preparations for the Nativity are moving along nicely and we hope to see as many of you there as possible! We are also looking forward to the pantomime trip next week.

We had fun working on Christmas poems and decoration building with Mistletoe the Elf (a.k.a Mrs Steemson), who came in and worked with us one afternoon.

We are, pupils and staff alike, looking forward to a well-earned break over Christmas, rested and refuelled for next term!

#### **Hedgehog Class**

Another month has flown by and once again Hedgehogs have worked hard and had some fun! Every Thursday afternoon we been to space in our P.E. sessions. During this time we have cussed on jumping, changing direction and speed and observaskills. Children have had a real sense of adventure and fully embraced the role-play aspect of this.





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Maths for Year 1 has looked at different ways to partition single digit numbers, such as 2+4=6 and 1+5=6. Year 2 have looked at rounding numbers to support mental arithmetic, when adding 9 or 19 for example. Reception children continue to focus on counting and number recognition. All of these are basic skills that children need to support maths challenges.

In English and phonics lessons, Reception children continue to learn individual letter sounds and some children can now write an initial letter sound for words. They are also starting to blend sounds to read. Key Stage 1 has a daily Curious Quest which continues to inspire their writing under the watchful eye of Professor Klunk. They are also watched by Noodle and Titch, who check that every sentence has a capital letter and a full stop.

Over the last few weeks History lessons have explored the lives of Florence Nightingale and Mary Seacole. It has been interesting to consider how conditions used to be in hospitals and the development of our understanding of the importance of simple hygiene practices. It's also been a good reminder to wash our hands after visiting the toilet!

Last week we were fortunate to have a visit from Somerset Sight, which was a great opportunity to learn about the challenges faced by those with partial sight. Children wore glasses designed to distort vision in a variety of ways, which helped to understand the range of visual impairments. Kate also shared some of the aids used, including using Siri to send a text and magnifying glasses. Did you know that pelican crossings have a ball under the box that spins when it is safe to cross the road? Thank you to everyone who contributed to the cost of this visit, It really was worthwhile.

Reception have been enjoying lots of messy play and I am learning to put the aprons out with this. They recently arrived to find a Christmas tree made from spaghetti, custard and jelly, which they were very keen to explore. It didn't look like a tree for long. KS1 children also had the opportunity to play with this. Messy play often divides children into those that could stand there all day playing with it and those who have to build up the courage to dip their finger in. I'm sure you will know which category your child falls into.

Whilst Mrs Evans is still busy being an amazing Mum, we have been very fortunate to have Mrs Newman covering each week and this has really helped to keep the classroom running smoothly and children engaged in their learning. I have had regular contact with Mrs Evans and she is still very much 'in the loop' ready to pick up where she left off as soon as possible.

So with Nativity songs churning in our heads we prepare for the last week of term and look forward to all that it brings. Thank you for all your support this term. Thank you also to our amazing school staff, who work so hard to support your children. Especially Mrs Burgess who cleans up after our messy play!
